University Department Spotlight

WVU Research Apprenticeship Program

The Research Apprenticeship Program (RAP) is a two-semester program that allows students with limited or no research experience to use Federal Work-Study funds or gain course credit for undergraduate research apprenticeships with WVU research faculty. Research apprentices are introduced to research through assignments with a WVU faculty member, and have been paired with faculty in nearly every field, from arts and humanities (e.g., music history, theater, English, philosophy), to science and engineering (e.g., biology, mechanical engineering, math), and more. RAP seeks to expand opportunities for students and facilitate their introduction to the concept of scholarship while learning the research or scholarly methods of their field. Students in RAP aim to make significant contributions to the research while also developing skills that will benefit them later in their own professional careers.

Yaronn James C. Arciaga, a.k.a. YJ (pictured), is a senior mathematics major who originated from Davao City, Philippines, and resides in Hedgesville, West Virginia. YJ has an Associates of Arts in Civil Engineering and Mathematics from Potomac State College, where he served as peer tutor in mathematics, physics, and economics. In addition, he was a program coordinator of mathematics workshops for Potomac State's remedial students. YJ is a RAP student who has been researching the perceptions of facilitators in dual enrollment courses under the direction of Dr. Laura Pyzdrowski since fall 2020. Through his research, YJ was the winning presenter for the Human Engagement Poster category of the 2021 WVU Undergraduate Spring Symposium. Inspired by his research, YJ plans to pursue a Master's in Mathematics and Statistics, and a Ph.D. in Mathematics Education.
